






Legislative Day 2019!!

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News from the MSOTA Reimbursement Chair Amanda Jordan, OTR/L



By now, you should have heard the term "Volume to Value" which is the current direction that healthcare is moving. Like always, change is inevitable and, as practitioners, we must keep up! I have summarized a few of the major, upcoming shifts in payment below with the most recent articles from AOTA and Gawenda Seminars. CMS 2019 PROPOSED RULE FOR THERAPY SERVICES (AOTA)

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has issued its Fiscal Year 2020 proposed rules, including its proposal for the Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF) Prospective Payment System (PPS). CMS is moving forward with implementing the Patient-Driven Payment Model (PDPM) and proposing a new definition of group therapy, as well as a sub-regulatory process for updating ICD–10 code mapping and lists, clarifications to patient assessment language, and provisions regarding the SNF Quality Reporting Program (QRP) and the SNF Value-Based Purchasing Program (VBP). CMS is projecting that aggregate payments to SNFs will increase by \$887 million, or 2.5%, for FY 2020 compared with FY 2019.

Group Therapy: CMS currently defines "group therapy" in SNF PPS as therapy provided simultaneously to 4 patients (regardless of payer source) who are performing the same or similar activities and are supervised by a therapist (or assistant) who is not supervising any other individuals.

To allow more clinical flexibility, CMS is proposing to adopt a **new definition** of group therapy in the SNF Part A setting as "a qualified rehabilitation therapist or therapy assistant treating 2 to 6 patients at the same time who are performing the same or similar activities." The new group therapy definition is consistent with the IRF PPS group therapy definition and would be implemented with PDPM.

In the proposed rule, CMS recognized that therapists have the clinical judgment to determine whether groups of different sizes would clinically benefit their patients, which they must demonstrate with adequate documentation in each patient's plan of care to justify the use of group therapy to meet the patient's needs and assist the patient in reaching the documented goals. CMS also stated its continued belief that individual therapy is the preferred mode of therapy and offers the most tailored service for patients. As set forth in the FY 2019 final rule, there is a combined 25% limit on group and concurrent therapy (per discipline). This means that at least 75% of a patient's therapy must be individual therapy. Therapists must use their clinical judgment to determine the mode and amount of therapy that an individual patient needs to reach their goals.

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ICD-10 Codes: In order to ensure that the ICD-10 mappings and lists under PDPM are up-to-date, CMS is proposing a sub-regulatory process for nonsubstantive changes to the ICD-10 codes. Any nonsubstantive changes to the ICD-10 codes included on the code mappings and lists under PDPM, as well as SNF GROUPER software and other products related to patient classification and billing, would be revised by posting updated code mappings and lists on the CMS PDPM website. CMS' intent is to keep the same conditions in the PDPM clinical categories and comorbidities lists, but ensure that the codes used to identify those conditions are synchronized with the most current ICD-10 medical code data set.

Patient Assessments: To reflect the elimination of all scheduled assessments after the initial 5-day assessment starting October 1, 2019, CMS is proposing revisions to clarify regulatory language for patient assessments under PDPM. The new regulatory language would state that the assessment schedule must include an initial patient assessment no later than the 8th day of post-hospital SNF care.

2020 PATIENT-DRIVEN GROUPINGS MODEL WILL CHANGE HH PPS PAYMENTS (AOTA)

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) recently published its final rule for the CY 2019 Home Health (HH) Prospective Payment System (PPS). The rule includes a revised case-mix methodology called the Patient-Driven Groupings Model (PDGM), set to take effect on January 1, 2020.

The PDGM is a revision of the previously proposed Home Health Groupings Model that CMS did not adopt in 2017. The PDGM is a significant change that relies on patient characteristics and removes therapy visits as a determinant of HHA payment.

For 30-day periods of care that start on or after January 1, 2020, a patient must be categorized into one of 432 case-mix groups for payment adjustment using the following subgroups:

- Admission source: community or institutional
- Timing of the 30-day period: early or late
- Clinical grouping: one of 12 clinical groups that capture the most common primary reasons for home health care
- Functional impairment level: low, medium, or high
- Comorbidity adjustment: none, low, or high based on secondary diagnoses

CMS RELEASES 2020 MEDICARE ADVANTAGE FINAL RULE (Gawenda)

On April 5, 2019, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) issued the final rule for Medicare Advantage (MA) program (Part C) regulations and Prescription Drug Benefit program (Part D) regulations for calendar year 2020. In this final rule, CMS is implementing several sections of the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018. One of the sections CMS is implementing is Section 50323 that will allow MA plans to offer "additional telehealth benefits" as part of the government-funded "basic benefits".

Unfortunately, it does not appear that the "additional telehealth benefits" will include PTs, OTs or SLPs. On page 15695 of the **final rule**, CMS states "Section 1852(m)(2)(A)(i)(2) uses the term "physician" as defined in section 1861(r) of the Act and the term "practitioner" described in section 1842(b)(18)(C) of the Act. We have codified these statutory requirements in our final definition of "additional telehealth benefits" at § 422.135(a)(2), described previously. Both the statute and this final rule limit MA additional telehealth benefits to services furnished by physicians and practitioners as so defined."

MEDICARE PART B PAYMENT RULE FINAL POLICIES (AOTA)

On November 1, 2018, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) released the Medicare Physician Fee Schedule and Quality Payment Program final rule display copy, which will govern Medicare Part B reimbursement rules beginning January 1, 2019. Although there were few surprises, a payment modifier was established in preparation for implementing a payment differential for occupational therapy assistant (OTA) services, beginning in 2022 as required in the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 (BBA18). Listed below is an analysis of the OTA payment differential and other policies directly impacting therapy services under Part B. OTA/PTA Payment Differential: BBA18 requires services furnished "in whole or in part" by a therapy assistant to be paid at 85% of the applicable Part B payment amount for the service, effective January 1, 2022. For this reason, CMS has established two additional therapy modifiers for use as a payment modifier on the claim line—one for occupational therapy assistants (OTAs) and another for physical therapist assistants (PTAs). The new therapy payment modifiers for services furnished by OTAs and PTAs are required on claims beginning January 1, 2020. However, payment reductions will not be effective until 2022 under BBA18. CO Modifier: outpatient occupational therapy service furnished in whole or in part by an OTA.CQ Modifier: outpatient physical therapy service furnished in whole or in part by a PTA.

In the final rule, CMS creates a "de minimis" (minimal) standard to define a service furnished in whole or in part by a PTA or OTA, which must be reduced by 15% of the fee schedule. The "de minimis" standard CMS finalized means that the reduction to 85% of the fee schedule rate must be done only "when more than 10 percent of the service is furnished by the PTA or OTA." This 10% standard is an improvement over the proposed rule that suggested "any minute" of a therapeutic service would constitute "in whole or in part." AOTA and others had argued in comments that the "any minute" standard was difficult and unreasonable; the 10% threshold allows for more assistant care delivery, but still may present problems. This policy applies across all services, including evaluations, re-evaluations, treatment interventions, and group therapy; however, CMS acknowledged that future clarification may be needed in the CY 2020 Physician Fee Schedule rulemaking to appropriately consider a variety of clinical examples and scenarios.





Greetings from the OTA program at Holmes Community College. We are excited to announce that we graduated 14 OTA students on May 10, 2019. A few have already found jobs, either full time or PRN, while others are exploring employment and licen-

sure in other states; regardless, they are all preparing for national boards. From noon until 2PM during the month of June, the first year OTA students are leading activities and groups at Warren-Yazoo Behavioral Health in Yazoo City for school-aged children K-8th grade. The activities are based on the week's learning theme and focus on increasing communication skills, self-esteem, self-regulation, social skills, body image, and teamwork and leadership skills. In July, the first-year students will begin their Level 1A Fieldwork in the psychosocial setting, and the frequency will be twice a week for four weeks; during that time, myself and my cohort will be cleaning, organizing, and restocking the classrooms and offices to prepare for incoming-OTA student orientation July 19th and the new school year in August.

August will see the return of students campus-wide which greatly increases the excitement and electricity in our environment. The OTA program will welcome twenty new, first-year students and the return of fourteen second-year OTA students. During the fall, the new OTA students will be engrossed with information and assignments pertaining to, but not limited to, courses in anatomy, foundations of the profession, skills, pediatrics, and psychology. One day a week, the second-year students will be doing their Level IB Fieldwork, three days will be devoted to their last skills class and final skills check-off, and one day is dedicated for developing their self-sustaining group community project. 
